



ENSURING LABOR PEACE AT THE AIRPORT: Cleveland Hopkins Airport does not currently have a labor peace requirement in its concessions contract. That concessions contract came to City Council for renewal, and Councilwoman Maurer was the only Council member to realize it did not include this key pro-union provision. She stopped the bill in committee and only passed it once appropriate amendments had been adopted that met the needs of SEIU Local 1 and Unite Here.

STOPPING WAGE THEFT & SETTING FAIR WAGES: Councilwoman Maurer was a leader on the Wage Theft Ordinance -- a major campaign for North Shore AFL-CIO and the Northeast Ohio Workers Center. The Ordinance sets up a structure to educate workers on their rights and prohibits Cleveland from contracting with corporations that steal from workers. She followed that ordinance by championing a recent legislative fix to Cleveland's Fair Wage law to ensure that the fair wage standard is modernized and pegged to inflation going forward. Both bills passed!

HOLDING THE ADMINISTRATION ACCOUNTABLE: During Cleveland's budget process, the Mayor comes to City Council to answer questions. Councilwoman Maurer used some of my time during the 2023 budget to ensure that the Mayor committed to working with AFSCME before changing the jobs of union workers within the Division of Parking. And in 2024 she pushed for key wins for SEIU Local 1 during the Shore-to-Core-to-Shore TIF and subsequent Bedrock Deal.

SPEAKING UP FOR UNIONS: Councilwoman Maurer continued to build relationships with more of the 34 bargaining units that work with the City of Cleveland. When CARE 1975, the EMS union, had questions about their budget, she asked them at the budget table. When IBEW Local 39 came to a council meeting to express frustration over working conditions, they were told it was too late to sign up for public comment. With some quick thinking and texts to the union president in the viewing gallery, she was able to read remarks on their behalf during her allotted time.
